Sermon Notes

Text: Matthew 5:43-48, 16:24-26

Intro:

"You're perfect just the way you are" - God never said that!

"God loves you just the way you are, but he refuses to leave you that way. He wants you to be just like Jesus" ~Max Lucado

Matthew 5:43-48

"Perfect" refers to maturity, completeness, wholeness, fulfillment.

Hebrews 2:10

Matthew 5:48 (MSG) "In a word, what I'm saying is, Grow up. You're kingdom subjects. Now live like it. Live out your God-created identity. Live generously and graciously toward others, the way God lives toward you."

The Challenge to the Gospel:

We are living in "The age of authenticity" which holds the belief that human flourishing happens when every individual is allowed to express themselves freely.

"True authenticity is not asking God and everyone else to embrace your self expression; it's embracing the self-expression of God in the person of Jesus Christ." ~Trevin Wax

Life Group Discussion

Warm up:

1. Have you ever made a unfair trade? Did you get the better or worse deal?
2. What is the difference between the two statements below. Is it important to differentiate the two?

“You are perfect just the way you are”

“I love you just the way you are”

Study & Discussion:

1. Discuss the meaning of the word “authenticity.” Do you see this as a cultural value? What are it’s positive implications? What are its negative implications?
2. Read Matthew 5:43-48. Jesus’ command to “be perfect” comes in the context of the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus emphasizes a righteousness of the heart, not one of mere actions. In v. 43-47, Jesus gives the example of how to treat enemies. What does this have to do with perfection?
3. Read 2 Corinthians 5:11-21. What stands out to you in this passage? What does it say about the “exchange” Jesus made with us? What is a “worldly point of view” (v. 16). How should we view people instead? What does it mean to be a new creation?

Application:

1. Read Eugene Peterson’s paraphrase of Matthew 5:48 - “In a word, what I’m saying is, Grow up. You’re kingdom subjects. Now live like

it. Live out your God-created identity. Live generously and graciously toward others, the way God lives toward you.”
